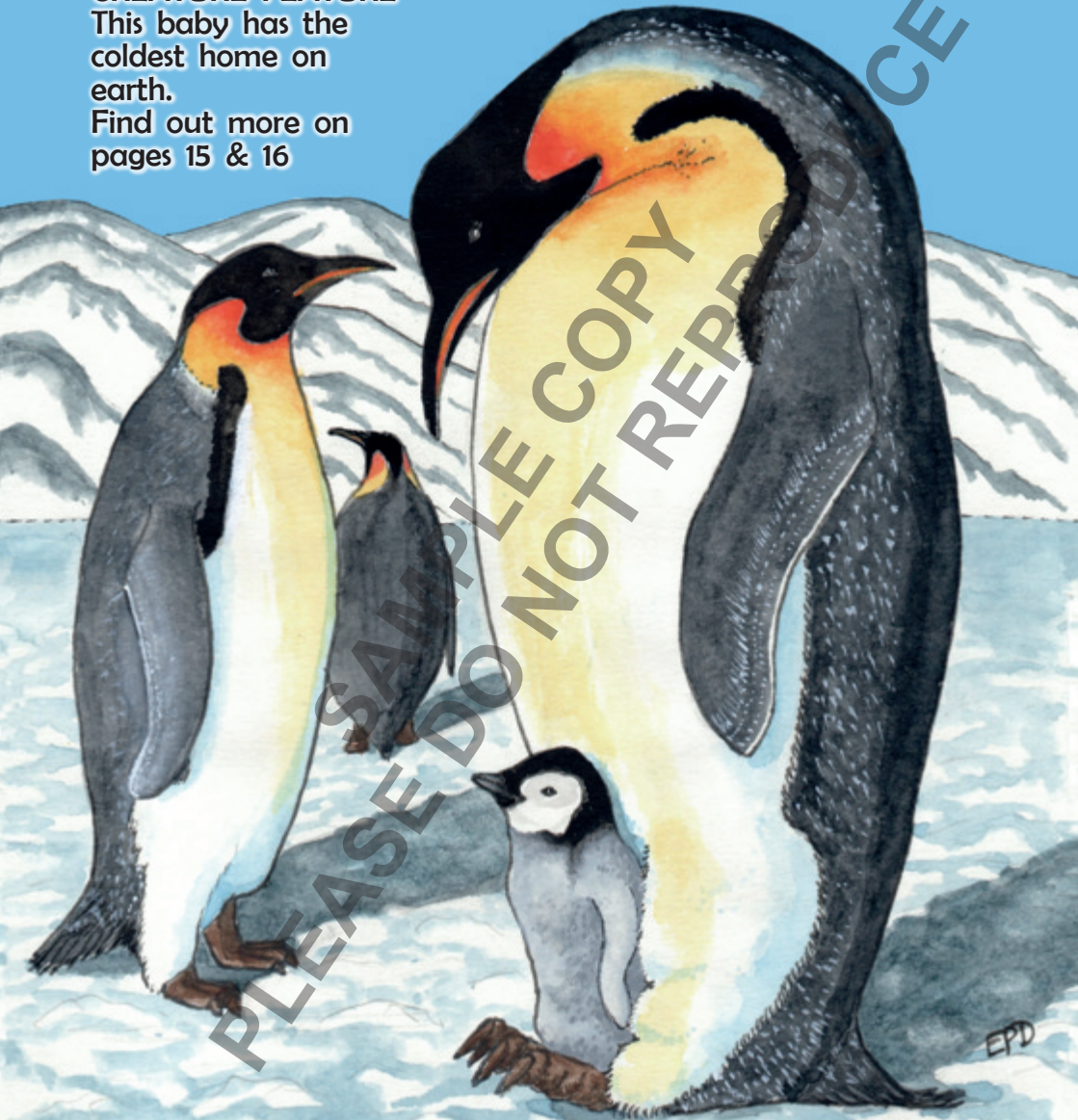

Servants in the Bible

The Favoured Servant

1 Chronicles 2 v 34 & 35

What does it mean to be 'favoured'? It is a similar word to favourite. If something is your favourite toy, you love it and look after it.

In the Old Testament, God chose Abraham and his family (the Jews) as a 'favoured' people. We read in Psalm 44 how God gave them the promised land because God 'had favour unto them.' When the temple was built only the Jews were allowed into the inner court. The greatest favour God showed to the Jews was that a Saviour would be born. The Jews were very careful to record their family line to prove they were descended from Abraham.

The Bible has some long lists of family trees. In the middle of one of these long lists we read: "*Now Sheshan had no sons, but daughters.*"

Sheshan was a Jew, but he had no male heir to carry on the Jewish family line. So Sheshan gave his daughter to marry Jarha, his Egyptian servant. Jarha joined this favoured Jewish family.

Why was Jarha, an Egyptian servant, chosen to marry Sheshan's daughter? Well, sadly we are not told. However, reading the passage it seems it was all in God's plan. Perhaps Jarha had come to believe in God and this was why Sheshan believed Jarha was a good choice for his daughter to marry, despite being a servant. God blessed that marriage and they had a son called Attai – which means 'at the right time' or 'in God's time.'



In God's time a male heir was provided and the family line continued. Read 1 Chronicles 2v31 and you see the family line goes from Sheshan to Ahlai (likely another spelling for Attai).



It reminds us of Boaz and Ruth. Ruth was a girl from Moab, but she had turned her back on the idols of her own country and come to worship the true God of Israel. Boaz was kind to Ruth and said, "It hath fully been shewed me, how thou hast left thy father and thy mother, and the land of thy nativity, and art come unto a people which thou knewest not heretofore." Later Boaz married Ruth - for despite her being poor and a foreigner, she was a good choice for him to marry because of her faith in the God of Israel. These examples remind us that it is not important if we are born rich or poor, Moabite, Egyptian or Israelite. What matters is whether we, like Ruth, have turned our backs on sin and have come to join ourselves to God's people to serve Him. Jarha was favoured to join a Jewish family. All Christians, through Christ, become part of God's favoured people. Are you one of God's favoured people?

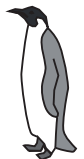

David's life as a hunted man

Part 12 - Saul dies and David becomes king 2 Samuel 1

David lived in Ziklag for sixteen months. One day, while David and his men had been away, the Amalekites had stolen all their possessions and taken the women and children captive. However, God promised David that he would recover all and he did. They all settled back down to life in Ziklag but just three days later their lives were again turned upside down.

An Amalekite man arrived with his clothes rent and earth on his head. He went towards David and fell down in respect before him. He then told David how that he had come from the battlefield where the Philistines had been fighting the Israelites. He told David that both Saul and his son Jonathan were dead. David wanted to know how the man knew and the man then admitted that he had found Saul wounded, and at Saul's own request he had killed Saul. The Amalekite had brought Saul's crown and bracelet for David.

The Amalekite expected David to be pleased with him but David was angry with the young man for killing the one whom God had anointed King of Israel. David ordered for the Amalekite to be killed and then tore his clothes in mourning over the deaths of Saul and Jonathan.

Soon after this David was made king - first in Judah and then seven years and six months later over all Israel and Judah. David's days of being hunted by Saul were now over.

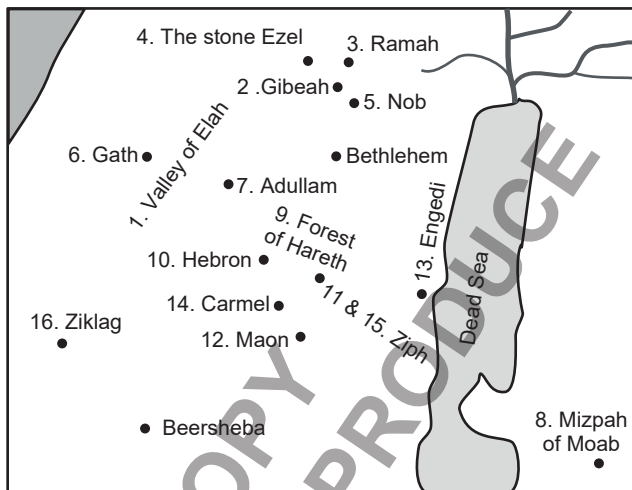
David had been hunted by Saul for many years. In Israel, men aged twenty years old and upward were considered to be able to go to war (Numbers 1v3) so David may have been about twenty when Saul set him over the men of war (1 Samuel 18v5). It would seem that Saul turned against David very quickly. David was thirty years old when he became king and therefore it is possible that David had been hunted by Saul for about 10 years. During this time there were some who helped David and others who betrayed him. Most of all David knew:

----- Psalm 54v4.

15 The Ziphites again betrayed David. **Abishai** went with David to remove Saul's spear and jug from his camp.

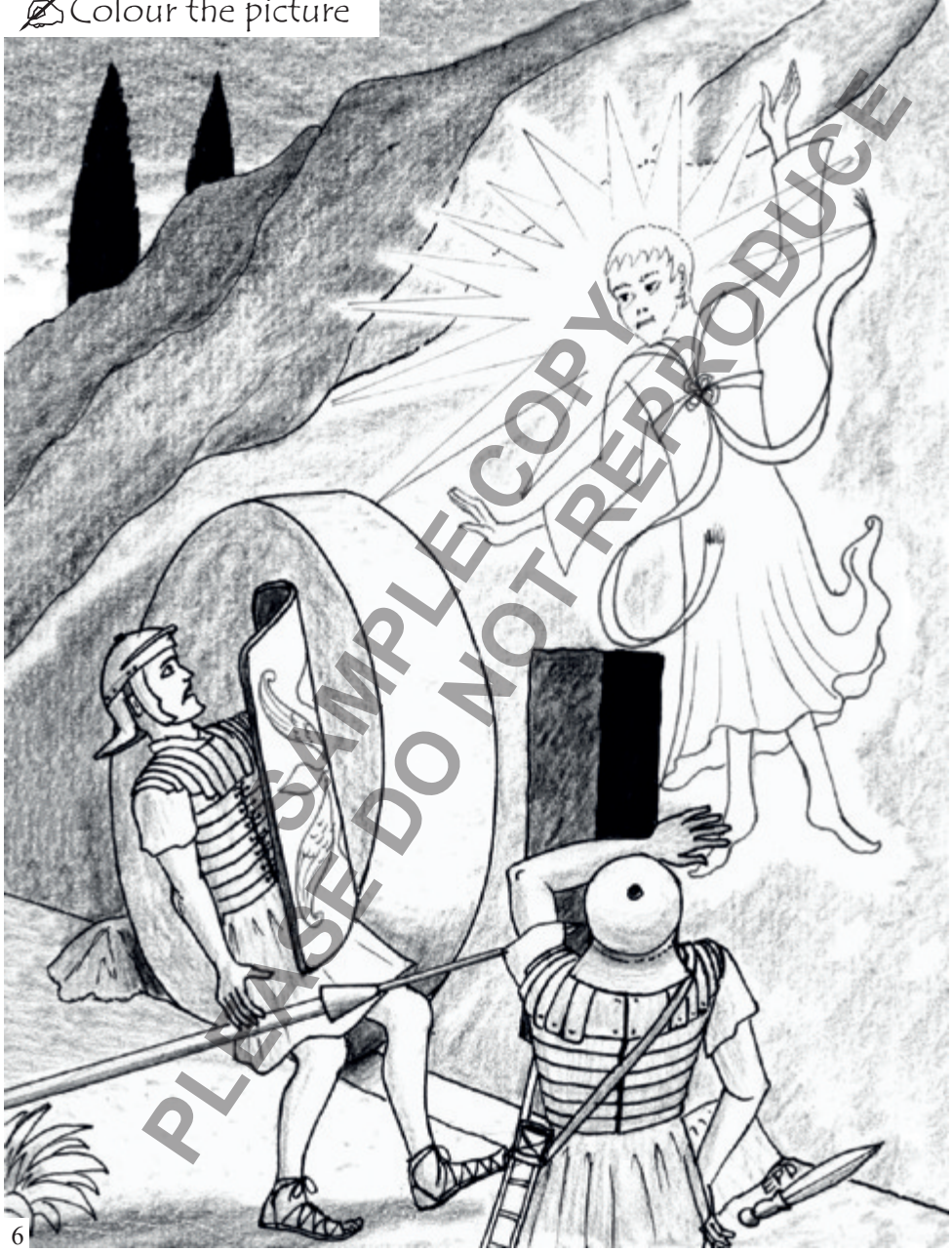

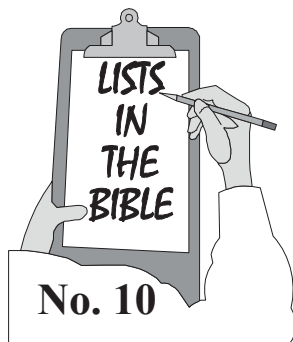

THE BEATITUDES - Matt. 5v3-11

The Wonderful Paradoxical List

The Lord Jesus Christ has given us this list of eight characteristics of blessed people, they represent both the graces and the duties of true Christians. They describe what God has done within the Christian's mind and heart. They may seem "PARADOXICAL," they may seem contradictory but they are not!

"Beatitudes" is the name given for this part of Jesus'

Sermon on the Mount. It may seem like a long word, it comes from the Latin word for blessed and blessed is a key word as you go through them.

Some important questions to think about whenever you read the Beatitudes:

What is meant by blessed? Is it just feeling happy?

What is meant by poor in spirit? Does this just mean not having much?

What is meant by mourn? Are these sad, distressed feelings?

How do you define meek? Does it just mean that you get bullied?

How do you define 'hunger...for righteousness.' Is this just wanting to be 'good'?

What exactly is merciful? Is it just being kind?

What is pure in heart if we know no one is without sin?

Can you define peacemakers? It is not merely peace 'keepers,' is it?

We do know this - the Lord Jesus Christ came to earth to bless His people, that is that we might be those who know His favour. The Beatitudes do two things:

1. They show us who are truly happy and what they are like.

2. They correct the world's blind and foolish ideas of happiness. The world has many notions of happiness which are misleading and wrong. They choose delusions, they '*court a shadow*' as Matthew Henry says in his famous Commentary on the Bible. He has a lot of helpful

things to say so we

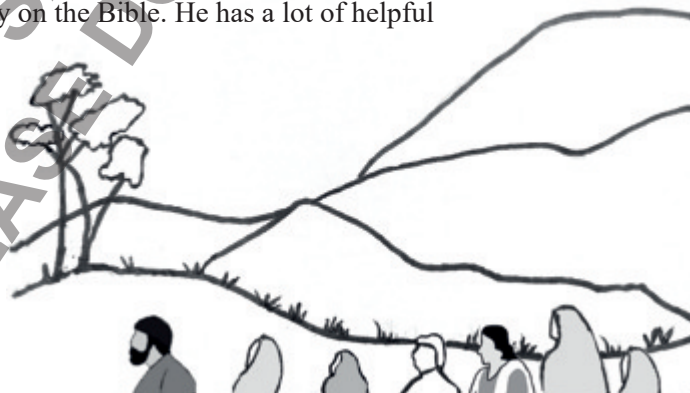
will use several

quotes from him. We

have shown them in

italics.

This list is '*designed to remove the discouragements of the weak and poor who receive the gospel.*'



He (Jesus) went up into a mountain:...and he opened his mouth, and taught them. (Matthew 5v1-2)

The Beatitudes 'invite souls to Christ, and to make way for his law into their hearts.' Let's take a look through our 'paradoxical' list.

POOR
IN
SPIRIT
v3

It is not about being poor, lacking what we need each day. Many are poor but proud; complaining and blaming. So poor financially is not what the Lord meant at all. '*The Church of Rome, who vow poverty, and yet engross the wealth of nations*' is a great example of this wrong idea. To be 'poor of spirit' is a '*gracious disposition of soul*' when we realise we are empty and need to be filled with Jesus Christ. To be '*contentedly poor*;' willing to accept God's lot whether we have plenty or not. This humble spirit, to be humble and lowly in our own eyes is a very reliable mark of conversion. The world hates this message, but Christians rejoice in it! '*It is to come off all confidence in our own righteousness and strength.*' To know that we are always in need of grace and mercy.

MOURN
v4

They that mourn are actually happy. How? This is not worldly sorrow - not a despairing sadness of spirit, nor grief about our problems - but a '*mourning, which may prove a friend to blessedness.*' It comes from seeing and experiencing this life in a fallen world so the true Christian mourns over the sin around us and in us. Christians are blessed by mourning over their own sin.

MEEK
v5

Matthew Henry says, '*the meek are those who quietly submit themselves to God, to his word and to his rod, who follow his directions, and comply with his designs, and are gentle towards all men.*' The meek are those who can bear provocation without being inflamed by it. The meek are happy even in this world. For by having this meekness they are blessed by being like their Saviour.

HUNGER
AND THIRST
v6

Those who are born again truly want to bear the image of God and to be like Christ, we cannot be satisfied with any other thing. '*Give me these, or else I die; every thing else is...unsatisfying; give me these, and I have enough, though I had nothing else.*' This release from worldly ambitions is a great blessing.

MERCIFUL
v7

Christians must not only bear their own sorrows and hardships patiently but also be concerned about the troubles of other Christians and show them mercy and pity. '*It is an evidence of love to God...to be any way instrumental for the benefit of others.*' We will love them for Jesus' sake - in thankfulness to Him for what He has done for us.

PURE
IN HEART
v8

Christians show themselves by this purity to be under the power and influence of the Holy Spirit. The true Christian longs for this purity as Psalm 51 says 'create in me a clean heart, O God.'

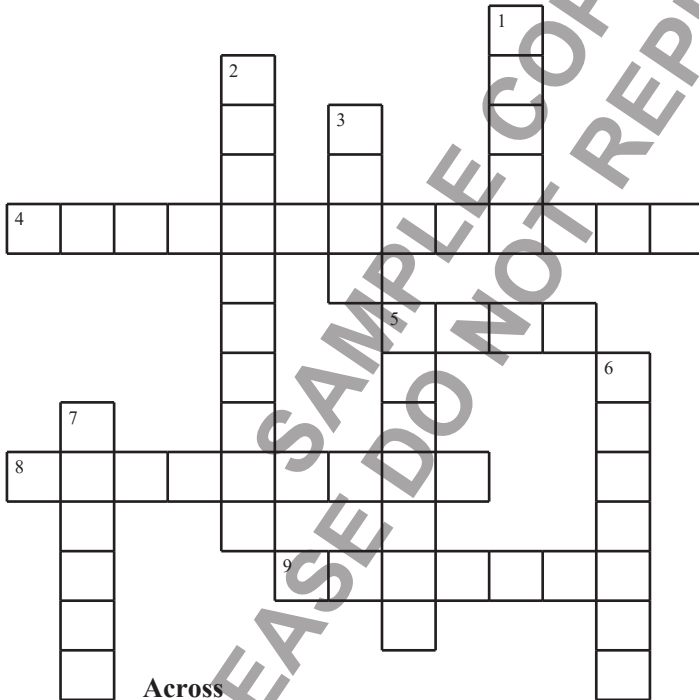

A peacemaker is often a thankless task, 'to be repairers of the breaches' such as when we fall out with our friends. We must do all we can to reconcile men, especially Christians. As Matthew Henry says, 'this is the greatest paradox of all, and peculiar to Christianity.' This, like the rest of the Beatitudes is a paradox or something that sounds opposite but really makes sense. To be persecuted and despised for Christ's sake, which can be even more hurtful than physical suffering, is rewarded by Him. No other religion teaches this. It is an opportunity for glorifying Christ. Don't forget it is not the Christian that the world hates, no matter what excuse is given, it is really Christ. Look up 1 Samuel 8v7, it is such a comfort!

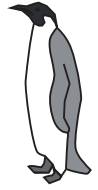

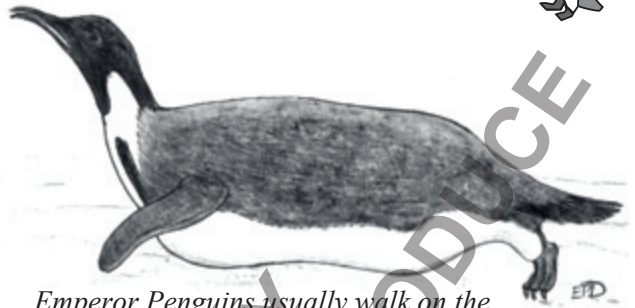

BABY PENGUIN, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE!

The chicks of the Emperor Penguin are born into the coldest home in the world - on the ice of Antarctica! The temperature may fall to 50 degrees below freezing in the snow and ice of long winter nights.

When you think about that you will probably have some questions, such as:



Emperor Penguins usually walk on the snow and ice, but if they want to go faster, they flop down and "toboggan" on their tummies.

Q1. How do parent penguins stay alive?

A. The adults get plenty of food in the summer, and they get very fat. Their bodies use this fat to keep them alive and warm for the many weeks when they cannot get food. They also have dense layers of warm feathers which keep the cold and wet out. In the very cold weather they huddle together to keep each other warm.

Q2. How do they keep the eggs and babies warm?

A. In the breeding season, the parents grow a fold of skin under their tummies and over their feet. This makes a warm cover almost like a pouch. The parent keeps the egg or chick on its feet to protect it from the cold ice underfoot. It also helps it to lean back on its tail, with its toes pointing up (see cover).

Q3. Does the parent have to stand still all the time?

A. No. It can shuffle around slowly, keeping the egg on its feet.

Q4. Which parent cares for the egg or baby?

A. Mother Emperor Penguins only lay one egg per season. The father then takes charge of it, keeping it warm under his skin flap. Mother then walks back to the sea and feasts on fish to get fattened up. Later she returns, by which time the egg has hatched. So she then takes over the baby and feeds it while father goes off for his turn to feast in the sea. As the chick grows, it needs more food, and when it is big enough, both parents may be away at once. Groups of chicks are guarded by a few 'childminder' adults. Emperors breed in colonies called 'rookeries' with thousands of others.

Q5. What are the chicks fed on?

A. The fat in the parent's body produces a kind of baby food in its crop (stomach). They can bring this up and feed the chick with it. It contains all the chick needs to grow and develop.

Q6. Why do they have babies in winter?

A. No other birds breed in the autumn and have chicks in winter. It is probably so that the fully grown chicks are ready to go out into the world when spring comes, and they have the best chance of surviving before winter comes again.

Q7. What enemies do they have?

A. If small chicks are not guarded by adults, they may be attacked by Skuas (robber gulls). In the sea penguins may be caught by Leopard Seals and Killer Whales.

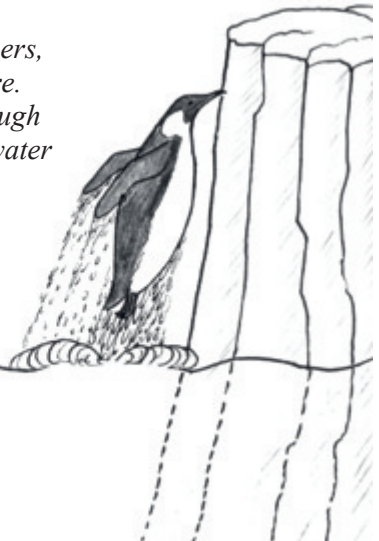
Q8. Were penguins able to fly, long ago?

A. Many books and people say that penguins came from flying sea birds, but that they gradually lost the power of flight and used their wings for swimming. There is no proof that this happened at all, it is just a guess, and it does not make sense. Many birds can swim and dive, and fly as well, so why shouldn't penguins? God designed them to be wonderful swimmers from the beginning.

Part 3: An Ongoing Battle

THE UNSEEN HAND OF GOD

There is one key character from the book of Esther who we have not yet been introduced to. He makes his first appearance in chapter 3. King Ahasuerus promotes Haman to be above all of the other officials and princes. This man is second in command to the king, but who was he? He was ‘Haman the son of Hammedatha the Agagite’ (ch 3 v 1). When you first come across this, you might be tempted to think that it was just added for interest. After all, we know that the Jews enjoyed family history and genealogies. Then we reach verse 10 and again read ‘Haman the son of Hammedatha the Agagite.’ When we find things repeated in the Bible, we should stop and ask ourselves what we are meant to learn. Why does it matter that he was the son of Hammedatha and an Agagite?

Let’s start with who the Agagites were. Agag is a name that we come across in 1 Samuel 15. He was the king of the Amalekites, an old enemy of Israel. King Saul had been commanded to utterly destroy them, but he disobeyed. Samuel had to step in and finish the task of executing King Agag. Were the Agagites descendants of this king? Were there others that Saul failed to destroy? If that is the case, Haman’s very existence was the result of Saul’s disobedience. Sin has longer-lasting consequences than we imagine.

Haman isn’t the only person introduced with his father’s name and family. Mordecai is also introduced as the son of Kish, a Benjamite. Given what we have said about Haman’s ancestors, this now seems important. We know someone else who was from the tribe of Benjamin - King Saul. Now don’t get carried away when you see the name Kish. Remember that Mordecai lived in the time of the exile, hundreds of years after Saul and his father, who was also called Kish. However, perhaps the shared name is meant to get us thinking. Suddenly, we can see a connection between Mordecai and King Saul, both from the tribe of Benjamin. Once again we have God’s people (firstly represented by Saul, now by Mordecai) facing an enemy. Then, the enemy was King Agag and the Amalekites. Now, the enemy is Haman.

Haman may have thought that his hatred was only aimed at Mordecai. He hated Mordecai because he refused to bow to him. He refused to give him the kind of worship that belongs only to God. Haman wanted to make Mordecai pay for this, but it wasn’t enough to simply get rid of Mordecai.

He wanted to have revenge on Mordecai's people too. Verse 10 describes Haman as the 'Jews' enemy.' This is not just a personal attack. His aim was to utterly destroy the entire Jewish people.

The Jews were an easy target. They didn't quite fit in. They were exiles. They didn't follow the customs of Persia. They didn't keep to the same laws. It doesn't seem to have been difficult to persuade the king to agree either. King Ahasuerus doesn't raise any objection when Haman casually suggests signing a decree that will eliminate an entire people group. We shouldn't miss the lesson here that hatred and anger are not 'small' sins. They very easily lead to terrible acts. Remember how this all began, it began because Haman was angry with Mordecai. It ended with a decree 'to destroy, to kill, and to cause to perish, all Jews, both young and old, little children and women' (ch 3v13).

God's people will always have enemies. The Christian will always be at war with the world. The battle began at the fall, when God pronounced the curse. From that point on, Satan would be seeking to destroy God's people. We see it in Cain and Abel, as the wicked brother murders the righteous. We see it in kings like Ahab who wanted to kill God's prophets. It continues on throughout history as nation after nation attempts to wipe out God's people. We still see it today. Christians around the world face all kinds of trouble just for following God. In some countries, it is illegal to be a Christian, and you can face imprisonment or even death.

Will this be the end for God's people? Haman has set himself up not just as the enemy of the Jews, but as the enemy of God Himself. That is a dangerous position to be in. Although God's name is absent from the book of Esther, we have to remember that wherever God's people are, God himself is present. God's people will never completely be destroyed. Even death itself will not be the end for them. Christ defeated death when He died on the cross and then rose again. If you belong to God, you are already on the winning side.
